Subj: REQUEST FOR APPOINTMENT OF PSYCHIATRIC EXPERT CONSULTANT TO THE
DEFENSE TEAM AND MENTAL HEALTH EXAM FOR SALEM AHMED HAMDAN

1. Mr. Hamdan has been held in isolation for more than 120 days in Camp Echo, Guantanamo Bay. Prolonged isolation has been documented by numerous medical studies to cause temporary and permanent mental injury. (See paragraph 13 of enclosure (1)).
2. During my last visit to Mr. Hamdan on 16 through 19 April 2004, I noted significant signs of mental stress. Specifically Mr. Hamdan's guards reported that following my last visit on 19 through 22 March 2004, Mr. Hamdan became withdrawn, uncommunicative and in their words appeared depressed for a period of two to three weeks. The guards report that following this period Mr. Hamdan became increasingly hostile and displayed fits of anger. A week before my arrival, Mr Hamdan began a hunger strike over his treatment. During the initial interview of Mr. Hamdan he was initially withdrawn and uncommunicative and unwilling to accept coffee that had been brought for him. After the course of a four hour interview, Mr. Hamdan opened up and at the end of the interview, agreed to end his hunger strike.
3. During the course of interviews conducted over the 16th through the 19th, Mr. Hamdan reported that he had experienced difficulty controlling his emotions, going so far as to write himself a sign not to loose his temper. He had also experienced loss of appetite (I visually noticed an apparent loss of weight in contrast to media reports that detainees have gained significant amounts of weight), feelings of anxiety, and difficulty in memory and expressed desires to commit suicide. Over the five sets of interviews I have conducted I have noticed a continuous decline in Mr. Hamdan's accessibility. During the first visit Mr. Hamdan was immediately communicative and cooperative; during subsequent visits it has taken an increasing amount of time to gain a working level of communication and cooperation with Mr. Hamdan.
4. As set out in enclosure (1), Mr. Hamdan's symptoms are consistent with mental illness documented in case studies of prolonged isolation of prisoners and are indicative that the conditions of the confinement present a current and growing risk to Mr. Hamdan's well-being.
5. Accordingly the Defense requests the employment of Dr. Daryl Matthews and Dr. Hanan Hassanin as expert consultants to the defense team and for the authorization of unmonitored access to Mr. Hamdan for purposes of performing a mental health assessment. Dr. Matthews is a

licensed forensics psychiatrist with significant experience in the penal setting including consultation and testimony at The Hague in conjunction with the war crimes trials for the former Yugoslavia. Additionally Dr. Matthews has previously served as a mental health consultant for military forces regarding Camp Delta detentions. However, Dr. Matthews' employment did not extend to advice for trial and he has not previously interviewed Mr. Hamdan on behalf of the government. Consequently he does not have a pre-existing legal or medical conflict of interest in conjunction with his employment by the defense as an expert consultant. To the defenses' information and belief Dr. Matthews possess either in interim or final Secret security clearance based on his previous employment. Dr. Mathew's Curriculum Vita is attached as Enclosure (3)

6. Dr. Hanan Hassanin is also requested in order to account for cultural factors and to permit an independent examination of Mr. Hamdan apart from defense/government translators. Dr. Hassanin is fluent in both Arabic and English and is a board certified psychiatrist. To the defenses information and belief Dr. Hassanin does not currently possess a security clearance, but is a U.S. citizen and otherwise eligible for such clearance. Dr. Hassanin's Curriculum Vita is attached as Enclosure (4.).

7. Dr. Matthews and Dr. Hassanin are requested jointly as neither independently possesses all of the qualifications required for a complete mental health assessment of Mr. Hamdan. While an experience penal and forensic psychiatrist Dr. Matthews does not have the cultural or language experience necessary to perform an examination of Mr. Hamdan independently. Likewise Dr. Hassanin does not have the required experience in penal and forensic psychiatry. The defense team has been unable to locate a single psychiatrist with all of the necessary qualifications, to wit penal experience, forensics qualifications, Arabic language/cultural familiarity, and security clearance. (See enclosure (2)). Consequently the defense requests that both Dr. Matthews and Dr. Hassanin be hired as expert consultants for the defense team. Cost for Dr. Matthews is \$400.00 per hour and for Dr. Hassanin \$300.00 per hour.

7. On site/military mental health providers are inadequate because of the following facts: a) Because of the potential Military Commissions in the case of Mr. Hamdan and the lack of doctor/patient confidentiality at the Commissions, full cooperation with such providers places Mr. Hamdan in the cruel dilemma of cooperating and risking statements that may be used to incriminate him or refusing to cooperate and risking further mental illness. Military Order Number 1 specifically prohibits compulsory self-incrimination and a requirement that Mr. Hamdan cooperate with psychiatrist(s) not identified as part of the defense team amounts to compulsory testimony in his case. b) Even if a military psychiatrist(s) were directed to report solely to the defense and maintain a doctor/patient privilege, the defense maintains that they lack sufficient qualifications and independence to perform such an exam (See Enclosure (2)). c) Hostility between the Mr. Hamdan and military authorities resulting from incarceration significantly diminishes the likelihood of obtaining necessary cooperation (See Enclosure (2)). d) Cultural and religious factors would significantly impair the examiners ability to perform an adequate assessment (See Enclosure (2)).

8. Additionally during my visit of 16 through 19 April 2004, I witnessed the installation of closed circuit television cameras into detainee cells in Camp Echo. Mr. Hamdan reported and

the Sergeant of the Guards confirmed a plan to install such a camera in Mr. Hamdan's cell. The reported purpose of the camera is to remove the internal guard from Mr. Hamdan's place of confinement and place him in total isolation as a manning saving measure. Mr. Hamdan reports that during short periods of time when guards have been absent from his cell he has experienced bouts of acute anxiety and is extremely fearful of complete isolation from any human contact for extended periods of time. Dr. Matthews confirms that such measures will pose a grave risk to Mr. Hamdan's mental health and will significantly increase the mental degradation he is experiencing as a result of his pre-commission isolation. Consequently the defense requests that the Appointing Authority direct that a closed circuit television not be installed in Mr. Hamdan's cell and that a guard maintain a continuous physical presence Mr. Hamdan's cell until such time as an adequate mental health examination by the defenses expert consultants can be performed and an assessment of the risk to Mr. Hamdan be made.

9. In order to permit sufficient time to complete necessary contracting and security investigation in conjunction with the defenses request for expert consultants the Defense proposes travel to Guantanamo for evaluation on or about 14 through 17 May 2004.

10. Due to the potential risk of significant long-term mental injury to Mr. Hamdan, the defense requests expedited approval of its request for expert consultant assistance. 1 1. I am over the age of eighteen (18) years. The following is true and correct to
2
3 the best of my knowledge. I have personal knowledge of the matters stated herein and, if
4
5 called upon to testify, could competently testify thereto.

6 2. My qualifications to render expert psychiatric opinions include my education
7
8 and training and my professional experience, set forth in detail in my curriculum vitae,
9
10 which is attached as Exhibit A.

11 3. I received my M.D. degree in 1973 from the Johns Hopkins University
12
13 School of Medicine. My postgraduate medical education included a residency in psychiatry
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15 at Johns Hopkins Hospital from 1973 to 1976 and a fellowship in forensic psychiatry at the
16
17 University of Virginia Schools of Law and Medicine. I am board certified in psychiatry and
18
19 forensic psychiatry by the American Board of Psychiatry and Neurology, serve as an
20
21 Examiner for that Board, and as a member of the Board's Forensic Psychiatry Examination
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23 Committee.

24 4. I have held faculty positions in medicine and public health at the Johns
25
26 Hopkins University, Boston University, The University of Virginia, and the University of
27
28 Arkansas, and am currently Professor of Psychiatry and Director of the Forensic Psychiatry
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30 Program at the John A. Burns School of Medicine at the University of Hawaii.

31 5. I have conducted psychiatric evaluations of more than 1,000 patients or
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33 forensic examinees, hundreds of them within the confines of jails, prisons, and similar
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35 facilities. These have included scores of facilities in 12 states, of all security levels,
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37 operated by local, state, civilian federal, and military authorities.

38 6. My evaluations and expert opinions have been admitted into evidence in
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40 more than 500 legal proceedings, including commitment hearings, civil trials, and criminal
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1 trials. I have been admitted to testify as an expert at trial by state and federal courts and
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3 military courts-martial in 20 states.

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5 7. My sources of information in this matter are:

7 (a) Affidavit of Mr. Salem Ahmed Salem Hamdan, (translated by Mr. Charles
8 Schmitz), of February 9, 2004, and

10 (b) Representations made to me by Mr. Hamdan's attorney, LCDR Charles
11 Swift.

14 8. According to his affidavit and his attorney, Mr. Hamdan is approximately 34
15 year-old married Yemini male, father of two children ages 4 and 2, who is currently
16 confined at the U.S. Naval Base, Guantanamo Cuba.
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19 9. Since December 2003 Mr. Hamdan has been confined alone in a cell, in a
20 house that is guarded by a single non-Arabic-speaking guard. A translator is rarely
21 available. He receives 60 minutes of exercise outdoors three times a week, only at night.
22

23
24 10. Mr. Hamdan has met his attorney, but he has not been charged with any
25 offense. He has been told that he is facing trial before a military commission, but does not
26 know when this is to occur. He understands that, even if acquitted, he potentially faces
27 indefinite confinement at the discretion of the U.S. government.
28

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30 11. Mr. Hamdan has described his moods during his period of solitary
31 confinement as deteriorating, and as encompassing frustration, rage (although he has not
32 been violent), loneliness, despair, depression, anxiety, and emotional outbursts. He asserted
33 that he has considered confessing falsely to ameliorate his situation. LCDR Swift has
34 described Mr. Hamdan's condition to me, as observed during their meetings, as initially
35 agitated and withdrawn, with a brightening mood as the visit proceeds, but ending with
36 Mr. Hamdan begging him not to leave.
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1 12. Mr. Hamdan's past history includes the death of both parents before he was
2
3 12 years old, followed by periods of non-supervision and homelessness.

4 13. The medical literature has described the harmful mental effects of solitary
5
6 confinement at least since 1854; the recent literature confirms their presence. Adverse
7
8 effects include hypersensitivity to external stimuli, hallucinations, perceptual distortions,
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10 derealization experiences, depression, anxiety, mood liability, difficulties in concentration
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12 and memory, paranoid thinking, and problems with impulse control. The extent of these
13
14 appears to vary with the length of solitary confinement and the degree of isolation
15
16 experienced. There is evidence that some prisoners suffer long term psychological damage
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18 as a result of such confinement.

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20 14. It is my opinion, to a reasonable medical certainty, that Mr. Hamdan's current
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22 conditions of confinement place him at significant risk for future psychiatric deterioration,
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24 possibly including the development of irreversible psychiatric symptoms. Additionally the
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26 conditions of his confinement make Mr. Hamdan particularly susceptible to mental coercion
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28 and false confession in conjunction with his case.

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30 15. The conditions of confinement described by Mr. Hamdan and his legal
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32 counsel may also cause deterioration to the point of significant impairment of his ability to
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34 assess his legal situation and assist defense counsel. His array of pre-isolation stressors
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36 place him at particularly high risk, as does the psychological stress of the uncertainty he
37
38 faces over his lack of charges and about the nature and duration of his future confinement.

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40 16. It is my medical opinion that a release from solitary confinement and a return
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42 to the general population combined with a definite advisement as to potential charges and
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44 proceedings would significantly mitigate the risk of mental impairment/coercion in
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46 Mr. Hamdan's case.

STATEMENT OF DR. DARYL MATTHEWS

RE: NEED FOR MENTAL HEALTH EXAM OF SALIM AHMED HAMDAN

This statement is made at the request of LCDR Charles Swift ,JAGC, USN concerning the potential for medical injury posed to Mr. Hamdan by the conditions of his confinement and the need for an appropriate mental health evaluation.

This statement is made in expansion to and as supplement to my previous declaration in the case of *Swift v. Rumsfeld* and incorporates the following additional information related to me by LCDR Swift following his most recent meeting with his client that:

- a. Mr. Hamdan's guards have noted increasing withdrawal, irritability, and signs that they interpret as depression.
- b. In his visit with Mr. Hamdan, LCDR Swift observed apparent weight loss, a continuation of his ongoing withdrawal, and difficulty establishing communication and cooperation.
- c. LCDR Swift reported that Mr. Hamdan complained to him of difficulty controlling his emotions, loss of appetite, anxiety, memory difficulties, and thoughts of suicide.

Assuming the accuracy of the foregoing, it is my opinion that Mr. Hamdan's conditions of confinement have induced in him a serious mental disorder that is worsening on an ongoing basis. The most likely condition is major depression. If significant changes are not made in his conditions of confinement, his mental condition is likely to worsen further, placing him at substantial risk for loss of contact with reality, aggressive outbursts, deteriorating mood, and suicidal behavior, and with the attendant medicolegal risks of loss of competency to stand trial, and confessing falsely to secure better treatment.

Because of the above, Mr. Hamdan requires a thorough psychiatric evaluation. While there are presumably mental health services available to Mr. Hamdan through usual channels, I believe those will not be adequate because:

- a. The short supply of mental health personnel would prevent staff from spending enough time to develop the rapport necessary to conduct a thorough evaluation on a difficult-to-reach patient.

b. Service providers are likely to be perceived by Mr. Hamdan as antagonistic to his interests and as not being bound by confidentiality, thus making rapport building difficult or impossible.

c. Providers are unlikely to have adequate levels of cultural competence, and are unlikely to be adequately alert to cultural and linguistic issues inherent in Mr. Hamdan's condition and in the evaluation process. Culturally competent care is now a routine standard for mental health services in institutions.

d. Providers are unlikely to have sufficient access to interpreting services to spend the time necessary to develop a rapport with Mr. Hamdan.


e. Providers are unlikely to have had sufficient experience in working with penal or correctional populations to adequately assess psychological responses to detention and isolation.

f. Providers are unlikely to have sufficient forensic experience to evaluate Mr. Hamdan's ability to assist counsel.

g. Providers would have a potential ethical conflict of interest as they would be in the position of both providing mental health care and medicolegal opinions.

If permitted, I would conduct an evaluation conjointly with Dr. Hanan Hassanin, a board-certified psychiatrist whose native language is Arabic and who is familiar with cultural issues in Arabic populations. I am experienced in cultural psychiatry, and in conducting such joint cross-linguistic/cultural evaluations. I have done so in major felony cases in the US, as well as at the request of the Prosecutor's Office of the International Criminal Tribunal for the Former Yugoslavia. I believe that it is strongly in Mr. Hamdan's interest that he receive an evaluation as soon as possible.

LCDR Swift has informed me that security personnel may be replaced by electronic surveillance of Mr. Hamdan's cell. I believe that whatever little human contact Mr. Hamdan has is very important to his mental health, and that removing it would place him at additional risk for serious deterioration.
